LSCPA TOP 10 NATIONAL 'INFLUENCER'

Lamar State College Port Arthur has been ranked among the Top 10 community colleges in the United States by Academic Influence, a new college rankings method that uses artificial intelligence technology to search massive databases and measure the impact of work by individuals who've been affiliated with colleges and universities throughout the world.

LSCPA is part of Academic Influence's first-ever ranking of the best 50 American community colleges, those two-year schools that award associate degrees along with a variety of shorter-term certificates. The rankings were derived from an initial list of 839 community colleges in the U.S. that met three key conditions: they were fully accredited, enrolled at least 1,000 students, and primarily provided two-year associate degree programs along with certificate credentials in most cases.

The Academic Influence list takes into account the impact and influence created by faculty, staff, and alum. Using a search method that covers the past 10 years, Academic Influence pores over open-source data looking for papers, chapters, books and citations to individuals worldwide. Collectively, these databases contain billions of continuously updated data points about millions of achievements.

"This is scientifically-driven data that shows a degree or certificate from Lamar State College Port Arthur is a life-changing investment," LSCPA President Dr. Betty Reynard said. "This ranking tells the story that our graduates go on to be successful, impacting their family, their community and the world. LSCPA graduates are an influencing factor in how the world operates."

RESPONDING TO OUR STUDENTS' NEEDS

STATE, FEDERAL FUNDS ASSIST STUDENTS, COLLEGES IN ERA OF COVID

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed the world in many ways. The way we live, communicate, interact, and learn have all been affected. If you look closely, though, you'll see a glimmer of a silver lining behind the dark cloud.

RESKILLING GRANT

The COVID Skills funding focused on preparing a struggling workforce with new



skills, even as it seemed the world was at a standstill. The Texas Reskilling Support Fund Grant Program provided \$300,000 to help students return to college if their education was interupted by the pandemic. Lamar State College Port Arthur was one of just 49

institutions in Texas selected by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to receive this money.

BUY ONE, GET ONE

Additional funding led to the popular "Buy One, Get One Free" campaign that took place over the Summer and Fall semesters in 2021.

Students who paid for one three-hour class would receive an additional three-hour class free, while the Fall 2021 semester offered up to six free credit hours with the purchase of six credit hours. That allowed someone to attend classes with a full-time schedule for half price.

"The pandemic has affected us all to different degrees and this is a way that we're able to help our community come out the other side better than where we started," LSCPA President Dr. Betty Reynard said.

RETURN TO FACE-TO-FACE INSTRUCTION

Even with the COVID Delta variant in the summer of 2021, the college was able to return to face-to-face classes for the Fall semester. Online classes were also still available for those who chose a remote experience.

"Whether a student takes classes on campus, in a classroom or on a computer at home, they will receive one of the best educational opportunities in the state of Texas," Dr. Reynard said. "Our dedication to students and their success, especially through this pandemic, has never wavered."

PARITY FUNDING FOR LOWER TUITION, FEES

Thanks to Texas Speaker of the House Dade Phelan and former Speaker Dennis Bonnen, additional funding was put in place to decrease 47% Tuition Reduction

the cost of tuition and fees at Lamar State College Port Arthur as well as the other Lamar State institutions resulting in a combined 47 percent decrease.

The cost of a 15-hour course load at LSCPA was \$2,165.55. After the Parity Funding from the state, the cost of that same schedule dropped to \$1,170. With the Buy One, Get One promotion, a 15-hour load for the Fall 2021 semester was only \$1,062.

"As one nursing student explained to me, it will lighten the load that she carries on her shoulders. This could be the difference between a student going to college or not," said Dr. Reynard.

GETWOOD WINS PAISD BOARD SEAT



In May 2020, Taylor Getwood earned both an associate degree from Lamar State College Port Arthur and a high school diploma from Port Arthur ISD's Early College High School.

Almost exactly a year later, he took on an unlikely role in the Port Arthur public school district. Getwood, 18, won a seat on the PAISD school board, making him the youngest person ever to hold that office in the city.

"My goal as a Port Arthur ISD trustee is as simple as this," said Getwood, who is pursuing his bachelor's degree at Texas State University. "I want to make sure that every decision that the board makes has been thought about from a student, parent, and district employee perspective."

Although Getwood's political focus is on Port Arthur ISD, he hasn't forgotten his Lamar State College Port Arthur roots.

Ahead of the Fall 2021 semester, Getwood participated in the college's Summer Bridge program, which helps high school graduates get a solid start in their college careers by showing them the ropes well before the start of their first semester as college students.

REYNARD TO LEAD NATIONAL TECHNICAL ASSOCIATION

Lamar State College Port Arthur President Dr. Betty Reynard has been appointed first vice president of the American Technical Education Association, putting her next in line for president of the organization in 2024. Dr. Reynard's appointment runs from 2021 to 2023. Her installation took place virtually during the ATEA's annual meeting on April 29, 2021.



"This is an honor that truly represents what Lamar State College Port Arthur pursues as a leader in technical education in the United States," Dr. Reynard said. "Providing world-class technical education not only makes for better lives for our students, but sustains the goals of our community in the areas of growth and prosperity for the future."

RUBY FULLER RENOVATION

NEW FACILITY GIVES HOME TO STUDENTS' SUCCESS

The newly-renovated Ruby Fuller Building is the culmination of a year-and-a-half of construction thanks to a \$6.32 million special Legislative appropriation in 2019.

Now, the Title V Program, funded by a \$2.87 million U.S. Department of Education Grant, has a home of its own, including a special place for its "Excelencia Center."

Lamar State College Port Arthur has been designated as an Hispanic Serving Institution, qualifying the college for the five-year award.

"We're able to have a more deliberate outreach to Hispanic students as well as first generation students, providing them with the necessary information about accessibility and the importance of education," Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Pamela Millsap said.

The Fuller Building was flooded by Hurricane Harvey in 2017, leading to the appropriation of money by SB 500 in the 86th Texas legislative session.

The facility also houses Enrollment Services and space for tutoring and student success coaching.



WORKFORCE TRAINING & CONTINUING EDUCATION

GRANT LEADS TO TEXAS' LARGEST CDL TESTING CENTER

The U.S. Department of Commerce announced in 2020 that Lamar State College Port Arthur was the recipient of a \$4.3 million Economic Development Administration CARES Act Recovery Assistance grant.

This grant, part of a \$19.3 million statewide investment, will fund the construction of a commercial driver education and examination center. The project is being matched with \$619,000 in local investment, including the donation of 20 acres of land along U.S. 69 by Jefferson County.

"As our nation responds to the worst pandemic of modern day, commercial

transport provides the link between field and market," LSCPA Vice President of Workforce Training and Continuing Education Dr. Ben Stafford explained. "Without commercial transport, goods would cease to flow and our society would grind to a halt."

LSCPA is a certified third-party skills examination provider for the Texas Department of Public Safety and the only third-party commercial driver skills examination center in Southeast Texas.

Construction on the new CDL training and testing center is expected to begin

in early 2022 with completion set for late 2022.

The project will cover more than 20 acres of land in CDL examination lanes, covered testing and practice areas, a new commercial driver training building, parking lot and retention ponds.

"Students work hard to receive training to become CDL drivers. The idea of having to wait months to start their new career is just disheartening," LSCPA President Dr. Betty Reynard said. "This grant award is the culmination of months of hard work by Dr. Stafford and his department. This is a proud day for our Workforce Training office and for the college."



ARMORY COMES TO LIFE AGAIN WITH CRAFT TRAINING CENTER

The cavernous three-story building on Lakeshore Drive alongside the LSCPA softball field has stood mostly vacant for nearly a decade. The occasional welding class and dressing rooms for the Seahawks softball team have made the building home.

The Armory, so named because it was once used by the U.S. military prior to being donated to the college, has already started construction on a state-of-the-art craft training facility that will provide education opportunities to help local residents get well-paying jobs quickly. The grant's intent is to serve as a job catalyst to support the economic recovery in an area impacted by Hurricane Harvey. The project is expected to create 167 jobs.

"Craft training differs from degree programs in that it focuses on short-term training designed to bring a student quickly into the workforce at a profitable wage," Dr. Ben Stafford, Vice President of Workforce Training and Continuing Education and author of the





grant, said. "This center will train craftsmen for all of the local expansion projects."

The facility will include classrooms, labs, office space and will continue to be home to the school's softball program. Construction on the upgrades began in 2020.

The City of Port Arthur's Economic Development Corporation is contributing \$1 million toward the matching fund requirement. With the initial grant, the total investment will be \$6 million.

"In 2018, EDA made \$587 million in Congressional supplemental appropriations available to eligible grantees in communities impacted by natural disasters in 2017," said U.S. Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development Dr. John Fleming.

FORMER PORT ARTHUR NEWS FACILITY NOW HOME OF LSCPA'S NEWEST PROGRAM

At one point in its long life, the old Port Arthur News building in downtown smelled of printer's ink and cigarette smoke. These days, though, you're more likely to catch a whiff of freshly-baked croissants or a savory roast beef.

A partnership between Lamar State College Port Arthur and the Port Arthur Economic Development Corporation has resulted in the new Culinary Arts and Hospitality program at the college. The aim is to give local students with an interest in the culinary arts the opportunity to make that their choice of profession.

"It's a lot like what you would see on TV," Dr. Melissa Armentor, Dean of Technical Programs at LSCPA, said. "The students can see exactly what the instructor is doing and then they get the opportunity to demonstrate skills themselves."

The old PA News building, now called "The Press Building," had stood empty for a long time before LSCPA and the EDC came together to create a classroom area where students and teachers could interact successfully.

"We wanted a space where students were comfortable and teachers could best demonstrate skills in an open environment," Armentor said. "The EDC was very accommodating in letting us develop the space in the way we want."

Students can earn a progressive series of certificates for culinary arts foundation and culinary arts specialist or a two-year applied science degree.

LSCPA GRAD RICHARD LOVES CAREER IN SPITE OF PANDEMIC

Joey Richard went into nursing to help people. It's all he ever really wanted to do. Now, in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, he wishes there was a way he could help more.

"This is more than just a job or a career," Richard said. "This is a decision about helping others."

Richard earned his Vocational Nurse license in 2017 and continued his education at Lamar State College Port Arthur, earning his Registered Nurse status in the college's Upward Mobility Program.

"When I was working to become an LVN, we weren't preparing for a pandemic. What's happening right now is really something you couldn't envision," he said. "Our instructors worked to prepare to go out and conquer the world but how do you prepare for something like COVID-19?"

Richard is working as an RN in the Baptist Hospital Emergency Room. He also works part-time in a local hospice center.

"I wear full PPE (Personal Protection Equipment) every day ... N95 mask, surgical mask, face shield, surgical gown ... it's not comfortable but it's what we

have to do to protect ourselves and those around us."

Richard said he has not seen his family for almost two months since the new COVID Delta variant has reared its head.

"The end of the pandemic is going to be a gradual process," he said. "It won't just happen one day. And it's going to take people working together, wearing masks and maintaining safe distance. We have to care enough about each other to do the right things."

As for the future, Richard is looking forward to the day when the world returns to a sense or normalcy.

"As long as I'm able to help someone emotionally or physically, I feel satisfied with what I'm doing. I don't regret at all choosing nursing as my career," he said.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

DUAL CREDIT STUDENT POPULATION GROWS 25%; BOB HOPE SCHOOLS NEWEST ECHS ADDITION

As Hilda Billups thumbs through a stack of papers on her desk, the pride and excitement are evident. These are statistics showing the growth and success of Lamar State College Port Arthur's Dual Credit Program.

"We're up almost 25 percent over the past three years," she said, a smile across her face. "We're opening up new opportunities and pathways here. Every student in high school should be participating in some form of dual credit."

Dual Credit education allows high school students to take college-level credit courses that apply to their college certificate or degree. Early College High School takes that a step further, enabling students to finish their high school diploma and an associate degree at the same time. "When they enter university, they already know the ropes," Billups said. "We've been able to show them a college experience while still in high school. That way, there are no surprises when they take that next step after high school graduation."

And while an academic route might be the perfect opportunity for some students, others might be more inclined to pursue a technical certificate instead.

"We have you covered on that too," Billups

said. "Two-thirds of our Dual Enrollment students are not part of the Early College High School program. And some of those students are pursuing Level I Certificates."





And now, Bob Hope Schools has joined LSCPA with its first cohort of ninth graders taking ECHS classes this fall.

"Bob Hope Schools approached us and we were thrilled for the opportunity," Billups said. "We started out with 63 ninth graders this year. These students were on campus for a Summer Bridge program that helped give them an idea of what college is about.

"Competitive students want challenges," she said. "Early College High School provides a rigorous pathway for those students who are seeking that challenge."

What did you do during the COVID-19 lockdown?


For Dr. Yumi Shin, coordinator of reference and access services at Lamar State College Port Arthur, it was research, write reports and get recognized.

Dr. Shin was recently named winner of the 2021 Community College Learning Resources Leadership Award by the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL).

The award recognizes significant achievement and leadership in advocacy of learning resources/library programs that are associated with the mission of community, junior or technical colleges.

"Winning this was quite a surprise, actually," Dr. Shin said just outside her office at LSCPA's historical treasure, Gates Memorial Library. "This is a national award

given to just one person a year and I'm in a small college in a small city. Last year, the award went to somebody from the Borough of Manhattan Community College in New York City."




That preceded her study, "Impact of Library Instruction Class on Student Writing at the Two-Year College Level," proving the value of library instruction classes for those students, which was published and won another award.

And the entire process went into this latest award: "Shin was selected for her commitment to leadership both within her library and in the library community, and her efforts in pursuing a grant to explore ways to get dual-credit high school students involved in their college library through new technology and services," the American Library Association said in announcing the award by ACRL.

Griselda Espinoza had already earned one degree from LSCPA and is working on a second one. It's that dedication that caught the eye of the Coca-Cola Foundation and earned her a national scholarship. The Coca-Cola Academic Team program named Espinoza among the 2021 Bronze Scholars, which resulted in a \$1,000 scholarship and a commemorative medallion. The award is given in partnership with the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society. Espinoza is vice president of the LSCPA PTK chapter. Espinoza, a Nederland resident, graduated this past Fall with an associate degree in Process Technology and she returned in the Spring semester to work on an Academic Studies degree.

MAKING SOFTBALL HISTORY

Before this season, Lamar State College Port Arthur's softball program had never won a regional tournament game. In 2021, the Seahawks nearly won the whole thing.

LSCPA finished as the runner-up in the NJCAA Region 14 South Zone Tournament after sweeping through the bracket to meet San Jacinto College-South in the championship game at Sterling High School in Baytown. "We've been on the verge of this kind of success all season," LSCPA Head Coach Vance Edwards said.

Cameron Niedenthal, a Port Neches-Groves High School graduate who was named to the NJCAA Region 14 South Zone first team, led the Seahawks through the tournament in the pitcher's circle and at the plate.

The Coyotes stopped the Seahawks 7-2 in the championship game but were limited to just six hits by Niedenthal who threw 12.1 innings over the two games Monday for the Hawks. Just two of those seven San Jacinto runs were earned as Niedenthal had two strikeouts and two walks in the effort. At the plate, Niedenthal had an in-the-park two-run home run. The Seahawks finished their history-making season 21-27 overall.

NEW SEAHAWKS TRAINER ANJIMA ADDS AN INTERNATIONAL FLAIR


